From Your Pastors Are You Bruised?

ESV Matthew 12:18, 20: "Behold, my servant whom I have chosen, my beloved with whom my soul is well pleased. I will put my Spirit upon him... a bruised reed he will not break, and a smoldering wick he will not quench..."

"The bruising is required for us both before and after our conversion. **Before our conversion the Spirit must make way for Himself into our hearts by leveling all proud, high thoughts, and** that we may indeed understand ourselves to be what indeed we are by nature. A marvelous and yet hard thing it is to bring a dull and shifting, unfaithful heart to cry with feeling for mercy. Our hearts, like malefactors, never cry for the mercy of the Judge. **The bruising also makes us set a high price upon Christ as Redeemer and Savior of sinners.** When we realize how precious Christ is, then the Gospel is truly the Gospel! The fig-leaves of our morality will do us no good then. And we become more thankful, those who were formerly so cold and barren and ungrateful to God.

After conversion we need bruising as God's sons that we might be constantly reminded that we are reeds and not oaks. Pride remains deeply lodged in our natures, and we need to know that we live by mercy alone. Think of Peter's being shaken by His Lord when he denied His dearest Lord. This bruising was not only for Peter, but also for God's disciples who know that they are weak. Peter's weeping bitterly can be used by God to remind us all of our weakness, and to be encouraged by God's grace. This reed (Peter), til he met with this bruise, had more wind in him that faithfulness ("Though all forsake you, I will not"). The heroic deeds of God's great worthies do not comfort the church so much as their falls and bruises do, because we are subject to these same falls and bruises, too!

Let us not pass too harsh a judgment upon ourselves or others when God does exercise us with bruising upon bruising; there must be conformity to Christ, to our head, who was "bruised for us" (Isa. 53:5). We must know how much we are bound to Him in our union. Christ will not break the bruised reed, though he will bruise. Physicians will put their patients through much pain, but they will not destroy nature, but raise up by degrees. A mother that has a sick and diseased child will not cast her away. And shall there be more mercy in the stream than in the Spring? Shall we think that there is more mercy in ourselves than in God, who plants the affection of mercy in us??!

Christ shows mercy to all His bruised reeds. He is our husband, shepherd, brother and by His grace will fulfill what He has called them to. He is described as lamb and even hen to reveal his gentle mercy to the humble hurting; He "heals the broken-hearted" and "Blessed are those who are meek and mourn..."

"Come unto me," Jesus says. "I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28-30).

Let us pray that God would forgive our ungodly and unbiblical thoughts about Him. Let us pray against our tendency to pride and apathy. Let us be reminded that we are those who are bruised with Christ, but that we are being healed, and this is a glorious thought!

Sermon Title: *“What Must I Do?”*

Scripture Lesson: Matthew 5:17-20; Romans 3:19-26

Scripture Text: Mark 10:17-22

Theme of Worship Service: A disciple of Jesus needs to know the right place to go, the right question to ask, and to have the right answer when asked by the Savior. What is the “one thing” we lack that we all so desperately need from God?!

Questions to Discuss with Family and in Fellowship:

- * Sketch what kind of person the rich young ruler was. How can you see yourself at times in him?
- * How is Jesus revealed in this passage toward sinners?
